

FUTURE: WILL

WE USE “WILL” TO ...

TO MAKE PREDICTIONS. Often with expressions such as “probably” or the verb “think”.

Examples:

I **will probably** be rich.

I **probably won't** be rich.

I **think** it will rain .

I **don't think** it'll rain.

TO MAKE PROMISES.

Example:

I promise I will clean the car.

TO OFFERS.

Example:

Don't worry. I will help you with your homework.

DECISIONS AT THE TIME OF SPEAKING.

Example:

I left the door open. I will close it right

SHORT FORMS

We can use “ll” for “will

I’ll = I will

You’ll = you will

He’ll = he will

She’ll = she will

It’ll = it will

We’ll = we will

They’ll = they will

I’ll (I will) go with you.

You’ll (you will) pass the exam.

He’ll (he will) win the match.

She’ll (she will) help me.

It’ll (it will) probably rain tomorrow.

We’ll (we will) open the door.

They’ll (they will) finish the test.

Also we can say **won’t** instead of will not.

Our parents **won’t** (will not) stay with us.

STRUCTURE

Affirmative

Subject + will + verb (infinitive) + object.

It will (it'll) probably rain tomorrow.

Negative:

Subject + will not (won't) + verb (infinitive) + object.

It will not (won't) rain tomorrow.

Interrogative:

Will + subject + verb (infinitive) + object?

Will it rain tomorrow?

SHORT ANSWERS

In short answers, we repeat **“Will”**

Example: **Will** you go to university?

With affirmative answer, **Yes, I will.**

With negative answer, **No, I won't**

Will she help to your sister? **Yes, she will**

No, she won't
